Mayer Property update

The Duwamish Greenbelt may be one step closer to being saved from further destruction, after the very well-attended public meeting organized by the Pigeon Point Neighborhood Council on Feb. 14 at Cooper School. Approximately 100 people from the neighborhood and various city agencies concerned with the project heard a panel of local residents present the complicated story of the 25-year fight against this development.

The serious environmental and property-infringement issues were discussed, and evidence was presented to support the finding that the permits have been cancelled a number of times, only to re-appear without explanation. The main point that was conveyed was that the neighborhood, along with a coalition of environmental and citizen groups, feel that the only appropriate solution to this protracted fight is to have the City purchase the property from the developer and designate it as a permanent

addition to the West Duwamish Greenbelt.

Representatives from Department of Construction and Land Use, the Parks Department and SeaTran made statements and responded to pointed questions and concerns. Reporters from the West Seattle Herald and the Seattle Times attended, and articles appeared in both papers.

Several things have happened since the meeting which are encouraging signs that the City is in fact committed to pursuing the purchase of the property, and that discussions are already underway between the Developer and the City. As with any land deal, agreeing on the purchase price is the crucial element, and we are hopeful that this can be done in a timely fashion.



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
